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# Dayton Pool Won't Open this Year

## CRACKS IN CONCRETE AND OTHER DAMAGE LED CITY COUNCIL TO DIFFICULT DECISION

DAYTON—Citing public health, safety and liability issues, the Dayton City Council voted last week to close the city pool for the 2018 summer season. The vote was unanimous.

"The staff was heart-broken," said City Manager Trina Cole about the council's decision.

The pool, which was built in 1982, is developing cracks on top and below the deck and in the crawl space, and is heaving in places. Cole said the entire pool needs to be sandblasted and repainted, and that work cannot be done before a summer opening. Temporary repairs are not being considered.

A month ago, city workers noticed vertical and horizontal cracks in the deck of the pool, and Adam Schmidt, Principal Engineer with Anderson Perry & Associates, was brought on board to take a look.

He presented the city with some cost estimates to repair visible problems, but said there could be further costs, if underlying issues are found, such as a crack in the pool and leaking.

It would cost between \$3,000 and \$6,000 to clean the drain system, repair the clean-out boxes, and repair cracks in the gutter system. Schmidt's estimate was \$10 per sq. ft. to remove and replace the recommended 300 sq. ft. of decking. He said costs could go as high as \$10,000, depending on what is found, after cleaning and crawling through the gutter.

An amount of \$82,000 has been set aside

for pool operations in the 2018 budget, and funds from that account will be used to hire a consultant with expert knowledge about pool construction to determine the extent of the damage. The engineer will also look at the pool building, including the showers and roof, to see whether there are other significant problems that need to be addressed.

City officials said they plan to conduct a public forum to share information, discuss options, and seek input as to how to proceed.

In the meantime, the Waitsburg city pool is a good alternative for swimming activities this summer, according to city officials.

# District Gets Top Marks for Community Engagement

## WAITSBURG SCHOOLS' COMMUNITY COORDINATION PROGRAM WILL CONTINUE NEXT YEAR

WAITSBURG – Two years ago, Waitsburg School District staff, administration and community members participated in a visioning process coordinated by Educational Service District 123, which oversees schools in southeast Washington.

A top priority identified through that process, was that the Waitsburg district should not only educate and engage students, but also the community at large. In recent months, the district has made great strides in meeting that goal.

In his first year as Waitsburg School District superintendent, Dr. Jon Mishra has overseen updates to both the district website and district Facebook page. The website includes several items of immediate interest, as well as school board meeting dates and agendas and athletic combine meeting dates. Meeting updates are usually posted shortly after each meeting.

Mishra speaks personally to the community through his Cardinal Calling video updates, which are posted on the website and Facebook page each Friday. Cardinal Calling provides updates on a wide variety of topics including testing, capital improvement, professional development, curriculum, fun projects and more.

High School Administrator Denise Winnett and School Board Member Russ Knopp play key roles in updating the Waitsburg School District Facebook page with plenty of photos, and keep readers informed of happenings on all three school campuses.

In recent months, the district has made several educational opportunities available to the community as part of an intentional Community Coordination Program. Although the first presentations haven't had a large turnout, Mishra said that those who participated seemed to benefit.

"Our goal is to apply a wrap-around approach centered on our children. Involving all facets, including school, parents and community will have a lasting and powerful impact," Mishra said.

On March 19, the district hosted a free showing of Paper Tigers at the Plaza Theater. The documentary chronicles a year in the life of several students attending Lincoln High School in Walla Walla.

# RECYCLING STATION NEARS COMPLETION

## Recycling is less cost-effective due to changes in market with China

DAYTON – Columbia County's recycling program will be up and ready to begin receiving mixed paper/newspaper, aluminum, and cardboard as soon as Basin Disposal, Inc. places bins at the county's new recycling station.

The station is located in a fenced in area slightly north and east of the entrance to the transfer facility on S. Cottonwood St. BDI will place three bins there to receive corrugated cardboard, mixed paper/newspaper, and aluminum, and the site will be monitored by camera.

That's the good news. The bad news is the market for recyclable materials is becoming unsustainable.

Waitsburg and College Place have recently shuttered their programs, and it could happen here, as well, according to local officials.

"China has just completely shut it down," said County Public Works Director Drew Woods. "And we are in trouble cost-wise."

Recycling is no longer profitable for local communities, since China has banned the import of many recycled materials, including unsorted paper and plastic bottles. The issue is affecting recycling on the entire west coast, Woods said.

Woods said the cost per ton to process mixed paper/newspaper is \$100-150, which doesn't in-

## Moments in Time

### The History Channel

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\* On April 30, 1933, Willie Nelson is born into a family of Texas musicians. He penned his first song at age 7. Years later he wrote "Funny How Time Slips Away," "Night Life" and the Patsy Cline classic "Crazy" all in one week.

\* On May 5, 1944, Bertha Benz, the wife of inventor Karl Benz and the first person to drive an automobile over a long distance, dies in Germany. In 1888, Bertha drove 65 miles to her mother's, over unpaved roads. She refueled the car with Ligroin, a detergent then used as fuel. When the car's fuel line clogged, she unclogged it using one of her hairpins.

\* On May 2, 1957, Sen. Joseph McCarthy (R-Wisconsin) succumbs to illness exacerbated by alcoholism and dies at age 48. McCarthy had been a key figure in the anticommunist hysteria known as the "Red Scare" that engulfed the U.S. after World War II.

\* On May 1, 1963, despite running out of oxygen, James Whittaker of Redmond, Washington, becomes the first American to reach the summit of Mt. Everest, the tallest mountain in the world.

\* On May 4, 1977, British journalist David Frost interviews former President Richard Nixon. In the televised interview, Nixon admitted that he had not thought the White House tape recordings regarding the Watergate scandal would come out.

\* On May 3, 1980, 13-year-old Cari Lightner of Fair Oaks, California, is killed by a drunk driver while walking along a quiet road on her way to a church carnival. Cari's tragic death compelled her mother, Candy Lightner, to found the organization Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD).

\* On May 6, 2004, the familiar theme song ("I'll Be There For You" by the Rembrandts) heralds the final original episode of NBC's long-running comedy series "Friends." The show had debuted in 1994 and ran for 236 episodes.

Josephine Elaine Thaut was born on March 9, 1943 in Colville, Washington to Harold and Helen Anderson. Known as "Joey" to many in her life, and as Elaine to family, she passed away on December 16, 2017 at her home in Dayton. She was preceded in death by her parents and a brother, William James. Joey is survived by her sister Aleta (Kent) Shockley of Dayton, son Scott (Paula) of Rosalia, grandson Derek (Valerie) of Colfax, a great-granddaughter, two nephews, great nephews, a great niece, and numerous friends.

Shortly after the Anderson family moved from Colville to Dayton in 1963, Joey moved to Lake Tahoe where she became a card dealer in the casinos. From there Joey moved into the field of marketing for a major hotel chain. Joey designed art to accompany our Vacation Bible School themes for the past few years. She loved fashionable clothing, especially shoes, and shared her thoughts and ideas about such things with those she knew best.

A memorial service and celebration of life will be held at 2:00pm on Thursday, April 19, at Dayton First Congregational Church-United Church of Christ where Joey had been an active and supportive friend. 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CAROLYN HENDERSON: TALK ABOUT ART

Stop. Look. Think.

While these three actions aren't necessarily the best way to cross a busy road, they constitute excellent advice for life itself, especially when it comes to viewing art.

Many people, however, are nervous about looking at art, because their major "teaching" in how to do so comes from clips in movies, in which actors playing characters we're supposed to accept as believable stand around and concentrate on perplexing images of irrationality. Given that most normal people recognize folly when they see it, it's understandable that they're reluctant to join in the game of pretend.

But looking at and appreciating art doesn't have to be an affected show of false erudition.

"My artwork is decorative and is my expression of my appreciation for design," says Gay Waldman, a Spokane photographer who enhances and embellishes her images through digital manipulation.

"My intention in art making is to make pictures that create a visual experience for the viewer to pause a moment, absorb the image, and possibly make a connection with form in color, line, and shape."

Waldman starts with photographs of flowers, trees and natural aspects of the landscape, and adds design and line elements, pushing color and patterns as she creates a unique collage. The result is reality and yet not reality: an intriguing feast for the eyes that does, indeed, require stopping, looking, and thinking.

"I crave the exploration and the creative process of manipulating images, and my passion is to push my photographs into images that expose my originality."

A varied and diverse selection of Waldman's art is presently showcased at Dayton's Wenaha Gallery, ranging in all sizes and formats, including long, vertical curved aluminum works that are perfect for that wall niche demanding something especially colorful and creative. Waldman's Art Event runs through Saturday, May 5.

Wenaha Gallery, located at 219 East Main, is open from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m., Monday through Saturday.

Lincoln High School Principal Jim Sporleder spearheaded the effort showcased in the documentary after being exposed to research on the effects of Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs). In response, he radically changed the school's approach toward discipline and chronicled the results, which included an 85% drop in suspension rates.

On April 12, Pastor Matt Wyatt gave a suicide awareness and prevention presentation to students in sixth through 12th grades. Approximately 20 people attended a second presentation for the community later that evening.

According to a report from the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the suicide rate for girls between 15 and 19 doubled from 2001 to 2015, when it reached its highest point in 40 years. The suicide rate for boys in that age group increased by 30 percent over that same period.

Wyatt shared from his personal experience and touched on topics of awareness, cyberbullying, parental roles and strengthening the community through awareness and kindness.

"When Pastor Matt shared his own experience, it was really emotional and it home because it was true and not just a story. It made me really want to

make sure to pay attention to other people when I know they are hurting", said eight grade student Alex Struckmeier.

A third program is planned for May, focusing on either ACEs or appropriate use of social media.

"Our plan is to continue with this next year and put together a comprehensive battery of activities for our community, including presentations," Mishra said in his April 13 Cardinal Calling.

The school district has also partnered with Walla Walla Community College to offer free "Parenting the Love and Logic Way" parenting classes. The free classes began April 11 and will run through May 16. The program is free and includes parent workbook, dinner and child activities. Call 509-527-4237 to see if there is still availability.

# Port to Consider BMS Building 2 Purchase

CURRENT OWNER WILL FINISH CONSTRUCTION; PRICE WOULD DEPEND ON APPRAISAL

DAYTON—Colby Litzenger, of Tucannon Development, LLC, has stepped up to the plate with regard to building number two at the Blue Mountain Station, reported Port Manager Jennie Dickinson, during the Port of Columbia Commissioners' meeting last week.

Work on the building by Litzenger's family-owned construction company had stalled over a dispute with the Port about whose responsibility it was to provide electricity to the building.

At a meeting with Port officials in February, Litzenger's father, Allen Litzenger said he believed the Port, as the developer, was responsible. That was contrary to the Port's position, which was based on wording in the lease agreement with Tucannon Development.

Since the February meeting, Port officials have been asked to buy the building from Tucannon Development. Dickinson said at last week's meeting that Tucannon Development will finish the building while a professional appraisal is being conducted.

"The Port has not made a decision whether or not to buy the building," Dickinson said. "We cannot make a decision like that until we see the appraisal. We will consider it."

Dickinson said the construction firm has to pay for the electrical extension to the building no matter what. She said the company is currently working with the City of Dayton to get water and sewer hooked up, and is covering some back door openings with better material, and they have signed a lease agreement with a tenant.

"This is the best outcome we could hope for," Dickinson told the commissioners.

The 6,000 sq. ft. building at 700 Artisan Way, has three additional 1,500 sq. ft. spaces that are available for food and/or beverage processing. Call the Port office for more information at: 382-2577.

DAYTON—During last week's meeting of the Port of Columbia Commissioners, Port Manager Jennie Dickinson reported that she has met with Adam Schmidtgall, Principal Engineer for Anderson Perry & Associates, to discuss an engineering design application for a \$3.5 million bicycle trail between Dayton and Waitsburg.

Dickinson said an application for funding of the design will be submitted to the Washington State Dept. of Transportation, Local Programs, in early May.

"We're excited to get started on seeking funding for the Dayton to Waitsburg bike trail. It has the potential to improve health and well-being of the citizens of the region, as well as improve economic vitality through enhanced recreation opportunities," said Dickinson.

Dickinson said the long-term plan is to apply for construction grants in 2020, and for actual construction to take place beginning in 2021.

clude the haul fee of \$255 per container, and the payment for cardboard is down to \$50 per ton. By comparison, it costs the county \$32 per ton to dispose of garbage collected at the transfer station.

"If there is contamination, the recyclers won't pay anything, and we are charged to dispose of the contaminated recycling as garbage, Woods said.

The county depends on a \$102,000 state Local Solid Waste Financial Assistance grant to help with recycling and provide for household hazardous waste mitigation, but the legislature has cut state-wide funding by 33% in this biennium.

Woods said without the grant, tipping fees would have to be raised an additional \$40. Tipping fees are currently \$89.90 a ton, he said.

"We made a promise to the public," said Woods. He says he intends to deliver on recycling, though he made it clear his number one priority is proper household waste mitigation.

Woods serves on the Solid Waste Advisory Committee, along with Commissioner Norm Passmore, the Town of Starbuck, the City of Dayton, Basin Disposal Inc., and others. This committee will work to prioritize programs and make recommendations to the community, he said.

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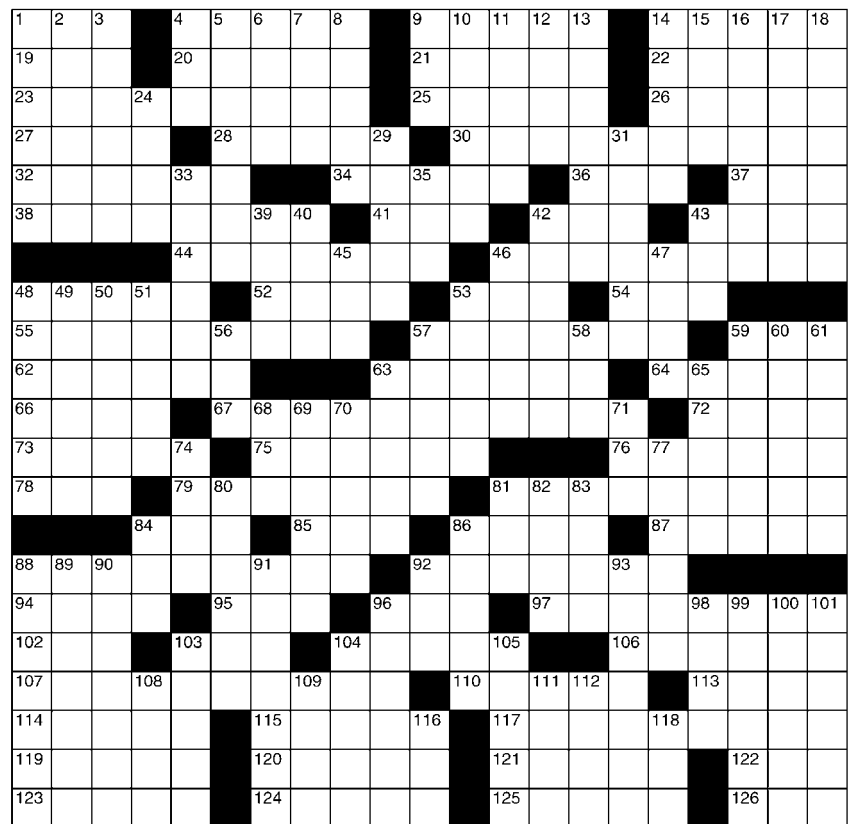

## TEENY MCMUNN: MY RECIPE BOX

# Asian Cabbage Salad

I have had this salad several times, with a few different versions, and I have enjoyed it each time. I think this recipe, which comes from Better Homes & Garden's All Time Favorites, is the quicker version, using packaged shredded cabbage.



### INGREDIENTS:

- 1 recipe Peanut Butter Dressing\*\*
- 6 cups packaged shredded cabbage with carrot (Coleslaw mix)
- 1 c. sugar snap peas, trimmed and thinly sliced lengthwise
- ½ c. coarsely shredded peeled jicama
- ½ c. thinly sliced green onions
- ¼ c. sliced almonds, roasted
- Fresh cilantro (optional)

### DIRECTIONS:

Prepare Peanut Butter Dressing. Toss shredded cabbage, peas, jicama, and green onions with the dressing. Cover and chill for 30 to 60 minutes.

Just before serving, sprinkle with the roasted almonds and if desired, fresh cilantro. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

### \*\*PEANUT BUTTER DRESSING

In a large bowl, combine 1/3 c. peanut butter, 1 teaspoon curry powder, and ½ teaspoon of salt, garlic powder, and ground ginger. Whisk in 1/3 cup water, 2 tablespoons olive oil, and 2 tablespoons lemon juice until smooth.

### MY NOTES:

If anyone does not know what jicama is, it is a bit like a raw potato but tastes like water chestnuts. Most stores carry them. I think water chestnuts could easily be substituted

I didn't make this recipe, but plan to when my son and his wife come to visit. I will toast the almonds, as I like the extra flavor it gives. Of course you can add extras to your taste. I have poppy seeds and will add them.

Correction from last week's recipe---well, I read it wrong, but you might not. I took it that the root beer from the marinated pork chops was also to be used for the sauce that is to be boiled down. Joe pointed out that the third can of root beer along with the beef stock, etc was the only root beer to go into the sauce, which makes more sense and it wouldn't take nearly as long to boil down.
