Makenna Barron is 2018 Waitsburg Celebration Days Queen

CORONATION DINNER, SILENT AUCTION AND DESSERT AUCTION IS FEB. 17

WAITSBURG – Makenna Barron, who turns 12 on Thursday, is most certainly the youngest Days of Real Sport or Waitsburg Celebration Days Queen, but she may be the most experienced as well.

Makenna, daughter of Charlie and Tracy Barron of Waitsburg, reigned as Miss Rodeo Washington Sweetheart in 2013 and was 2016 Washington Little Rodeo Queen. In 2014, at age eight, Makenna sang the national anthem in the Happy Canyon arena at the opening night PBR Classic at the Pendleton Round-Up.

In her roles as Miss Rodeo Washington Sweetheart and Washington Little Rodeo Queen, Makenna traveled the pacific northwest to promote the sport of rodeo. She said that traveling to new places, meeting new people, seeing new things and making friendships and memories were the best part of being Sweetheart and Queen.

Makenna was able to attend the Calgary Stampede as Washington Little Rodeo Queen, last year with the Walla Walla Fair and Frontier Days court, and plans to attend again this year.

“It’s awesome! The drive is long but once you get there, it’s all worth it. The rodeo is huge. It’s a sight to see,” she said.

And while Makenna has attended rodeos and celebrations near and far, she is more than proud to bring attention to the special attributes of her hometown of Waitsburg.

“I decided I wanted to try out for Waitsburg Celebration Days Queen because it would be fun to have an actual place to represent, especially since Waitsburg is my hometown. It will be fun to let people know how great our town is and what we have going on during Celebration Days,” Makenna said.

Makenna will be officially crowned on Feb. 17, but has been representing Waitsburg since Hometown Christmas in December, when she helped with activities and rode in the lighted parade. Last month, she represented Waitsburg at the coronation of the Milton-Freewater Pioneer Posse royalty.

Makenna was a natural-born cowgirl. Her mom, Tracy Barron, belonged to the Pro West Rodeo Association when Makenna was born and included her from the start.

Makenna was born in February and Tracy took her along to rodeos, starting that April. Makenna struck out on her own at age two when she began competing in Pee Wee Barrel

Racing and Goat Tail Tying.

Makenna, who had never had voice lessons, began singing the

Dale Slack to Seek Columbia County Prosecutor Post

CURRENT PROSECUTOR REA CULWELL HAS ANNOUNCED SHE WILL NOT SEEK REELECTION

DAYTON – Columbia County Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Dale Slack announced last week that he will run for Columbia County Prosecutor this year. If elected, Slack would replace his boss, current Prosecutor Rea Culwell, who has announced she will not seek reelection.

“While I am sad to lose a great boss, I am excited for the opportunity to serve the people of Columbia County in this very important capacity,” Slack said.

Slack joined the prosecutor’s office in 2015. Prior to that time, he was in private practice in Dayton for four years and served as a criminal defense attorney, including work as a contracted public defender for Columbia County District and Superior Courts.

Slack said he will file as an independent and state “no party preference” on the ballot. “I believe that the office of prosecuting attorney needs to be independent, that prosecutors should not direct county policy (that’s the commissioners’ job), and that legal advice should be formulated based only

on the facts and the law—not a desired outcome,” he said.

Slack is a native of Idaho and attended schools near Caldwell. He is a graduate of Boise State University and received his law degree from the University of Idaho.

“If elected, I will continue the work we already do in strengthening and deepening relationships with the Sheriff’s Office, and I would like to involve local businesses and community organizations in not only successfully prosecuting criminals, but preventing crimes and making our County safer,” Slack said.

He added, “I also will continue our office’s strong policy against domestic violence crimes, which erode the strength of families and damage the development of children present in domestic violence relationships. If the family is the foundation of our community, domestic violence crimes damage us all and weaken our County.”

EDITH LOUISE MASSEY

DEC. 5, 1917 - JAN. 30, 2018

Edith Louise Massey, 100 years old, died January 30, 2018 at Booker Rest Home, Dayton, Washington.

Edith was born December 5, 1917 in Chicago, Illinois to Pauline and Edward Seidel. When she was three years of age the family moved to the Los Angeles, California area. She grew up in Tujunga and Glendale, California. Edith was the middle of 9 children. She graduated from Fairfax High School.

During the depression her father left the family. At 14 she and her sister, Winnie, worked as live in nannies for other families and contributed their wages to the care of her siblings still at home.

On January 28, 1938 she married Clarence B. Massey. They were happily married for 58 years until his death in 1996. They lived most of their married life in Burbank, CA. until moving to Dayton, WA. to be near their daughter. The couple had two children – Bob and Carol Jean.

When the children were young they would tent camp in the High Sierras each June. Edith often managed the tent camping by herself while her husband hiked into remote fishing lakes. It was a special time for the family.

Summers were often spent driving her children to the beach or family member's swimming pools. Edith did not know how to swim, but was willing to let her children enjoy the water.

Edith worked at Burbank, CA. School System as a cafeteria manager.

She was devoted to her family. She enjoyed tending to her family and visiting with her siblings. Edith was an outgoing happy person who had a ready smile and a giggle for everyone. She liked talking to people.

Her hobbies included cooking and sewing, plus being present at whatever activity her husband was doing.

In 1966 Edith was in a car accident that left her with a damaged leg and a brace for the rest of her life. She continued to work at her job and do her normal activities once she recovered.

In retirement she and Clarence enjoyed traveling in their camper. They especially enjoyed trips to Alaska. She was often a model for his photojournalism articles. She made the sour dough bread and he took pictures of her serving the bread for his maga-



zine articles.

After their RV travels they settled in Terra Bell, CA, where Clarence grew vegetables and roses. Edith enjoyed selling the vegetables at local Farmer's Markets. She enjoyed baking and often made cinnamon rolls or cookies to share with others. She liked inviting company for homemade dinners.

She is predeceased by her husband, Clarence; son Bob Massey, PhD (Trinidad); grandson Rob Anderson, formerly of Dayton, and her siblings, Walter Seidel, Paul Seidel, Winnie Fonda, Helen Seidel, John Seidel and Ed Seidel.

Survivors include her daughter, Carol Anderson (Darial/Andy) of Dayton, WA; five grandchildren; Jennifer Wolf (John), Garth Massey (Katie), Tabitha Brown (Ariel), Heather Gum, and David Massey. She has 16 great-grandchildren. Her siblings Shirley Lalibete and Richard Seidel also survive her. She has many nieces and nephews who had close bonds to their Aunt Edith.

There will be a graveside burial service at Dayton City Cemetery on Wednesday, February 7, 2018 at 1:00 p.m. with Reverend Marj Johnston of the Dayton First Congregational Church officiating. Hubbard-Rogg Funeral Home of Dayton is caring for the family.

A Letter to the Citizens of Waitsburg

The City of Waitsburg has several items it would like to share with you related to City activities for 2018. First, you probably have noticed that your utility rates went up with the January billing. This increase was approved early in 2017 and covered 2017, 2018 and beyond. Its sole purpose is to cover debt service on loan dollars for improvements to the City's infrastructure; I will get to those details in a moment.

Second, with the cleanup of the Wastewater Treatment Plan (WWTP) area complete, all recycling has been moved to that facility, which is located at 16531 E. Highway 124. This includes cardboard, which can be unloaded inside the baler building, as well as the big BDI drop box for recyclables. In addition to moving recycling out to the WWTP area, the City is going to begin opening the gates on Saturdays for people to drop off recyclables as well as yard debris (only wood material that can be chipped) during the weekend. This service will continue as long as the area is treated with respect and materials are not removed (rock, gravel) or items dumped there that don't belong there, i.e. grass, leaves, etc. Should the area be used for something other than its stated purpose, the City will shut down the site completely and do away with the recycling bin. Recycling currently costs the City in excess of \$1,500 per year to provide to the citizens with little or no return on the service.

Last, puncture vine (also known as goat head) is a serious issue around the City and can get out of control very easily once warm weather sets in. The City cannot control all of it everywhere and needs to ask that should you see a plant near your property or along the road edge that you either spray it before it buds out or dig it up and put it in your garbage as means to help slow the spread of this noxious weed.

As for planned infrastructure improvements around the City, you may have noticed the large hole and machinery in Preston Park last fall. This work was related to the sewer siphon that runs under the Touchet River that carries all of the sewage from the east end of the City to the WWTP. The siphon area was determined to be damaged to where the connection between the two piping materials had begun sucking river water into the sewer system. Rather than dig up the entire line and do in-stream repair work, the City decided to do what is known as a pipe burst; whereby we have a new larger line forced through the existing one. This type of work is far less expensive and requires less labor, no permits and does not disturb the ground, leading to project cost savings. In the end, the project went extremely well and was completed in just a few days.

As with just about all the water and sewer lines around the City, the vast majority of water meters are in excess of 50 years old, with several slowing down or stopping completely and not accurately reflecting the actual amount of water used. For 2018, the City is plan-

ning on doing a city-wide water meter replacement project, upgrading all the water meters to high-efficiency radio read meters and doing away with the old manual read meters. This work will represent the largest single meter upgrade done by the City with the cost expecting to exceed \$350,000. This project will allow the City to recapture volumes of lost water while improving employee efficiency, as it will require only one employee over a few hours to read all meters in the City, rather than two employees for the course of several days.

For 2019, we are in the planning phases for a waterline upgrade project in the Taggart/Dewitt Road area that should eliminate all the pressure and water quality issues on the east end of the City where the mainline is undersized and cannot provide enough flow to accommodate the needs in that area of the City. As a secondary component of the waterline project, we are also designing a new road that will straighten out Taggart Road back to Highway 12, hopefully reducing or eliminating the issues associated with the current intersection at the Midway Food Mart.

Other tasks being done this year include the completion of the Main Street Bridge, sidewalk improvements around the City, as well as the development of a Park and Ride facility served by Columbia County Public Transportation and located at the old County Shop yard at the north end of Main Street. We continue to look for ways to try and revitalize the fairgrounds and recreational opportunities at Preston Park.

The City is rapidly approaching the next historical flood event with our hope being that the improvements completed since the last flood in 1996 will be enough to mitigate the majority of the flooding issues we face during high water events. As a way to mitigate these impacts, we are getting ready to start on our Flood Feasibility Study being done through a cooperative effort with the Army Corp of Engineers. The flood study will span at least two years, with the end product being the first major improvements to the levee system since they were built in the 1950s/60s, as it guarantees construction dollars by the Army Corp of Engineers at the end of the study.

Going forward, my plan is to keep you updated on these and other items as they progress. My door is always open should anyone want more information about activities within the City or ways they can participate in our local government through various committees or on the City Council, which is up for re-election in April. 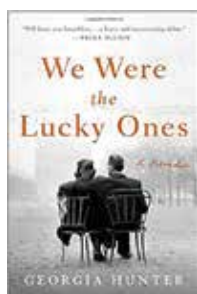

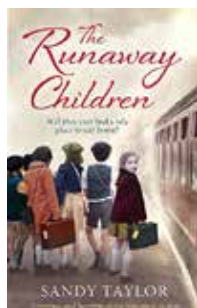

They are leaving the terror of the Blitz and nights spent shivering in air raid shelters behind them, but will the strangers they are placed with be kind and loving, or are there different hardships ahead? When little Olive's safety is threatened by a boy at Hackers Farm, Nell has to make a decision that will change their lives forever... they must run from danger and try to find their way home. Together the two girls hold each other's hands as they begin their perilous journey across bombed-out Britain. But when Nell falls ill, can she still protect her little sister from the war raging around them? And will they ever be reunited from the family they've been torn from?

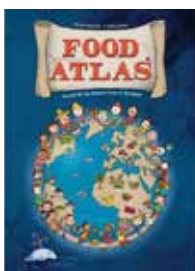

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Manufacturing the Future

COREY SUFFIELD MAKES USEFUL ITEMS ON A 3D PRINTER HE BUILT HIMSELF

DAYTON—When Corey Suffield graduated from Dayton High School in 1998 he was looking for a career in video production.

Twenty years later, Suffield operates a successful computer repair business in an office inside Suffield's Furniture, his parents' furniture and appliance store on Dayton's Main Street.

While that is not surprising, considering that Suffield has been fascinated with "electronics, computers and motor control stuff" for as long as he can remember, it is pretty remarkable that he is making items for use in his office on a 3D printer that he built himself.

None of that is surprising to his mother Carolyn, who thinks he is "pretty smart."

Suffield agreed. "I am pretty smart. Plus, I just like to figure things out."

Suffield said he studied graphic design at a small school in Tempe, Arizona, which he incorporates into his work.

He said he learned the most about computers from a stint at Sykes in Milton-Freewater, working as a phone computer technician. "I was basically building computers from the ground up," he said.

After that there were other jobs. Then he went off to Portland Community College to study computer animation. That was where he learned about computer modeling and began thinking about 3D printing and 3D animation.

This was also where he was introduced to micro-controllers, which are used to make lights blink, create sound, and which can be plugged into a television for graphics on a screen.

He said, "It had a creative element to it, and I thought, 'How can you use it?'"

Back in Dayton, Suffield was invited by retired DHS Ag teacher, Gordon Gerlitz, to perform computer maintenance, with him.

"It kinda blew his mind that I knew as much as he did about computer hardware stuff," said Suffield. "And then, in 2013, I got a call from the Dayton High School Ag teacher, Steve McLean. The Robotics department needed some help with the computer side of it. Without the computers and software, it ain't movin'."

Suffield said he was given a short time frame to work on that, but he was "well versed" and able to figure it out within a couple of weeks before the team attended the F.I.R.S.T. Robotics competition in Cheney.

"In the meantime, Windows 10 came out and Gerlitz handed the reins of his business over to me," said Suffield.

Suffield said 3D printing started to become widely discussed on the Internet around the year 2000, beginning with Reprap, the "grandfather" of 3D printing.

"It was somewhat primitive. Now it is more-well-developed," he said. "It was called the machine that can replicate itself. That hasn't happened yet. For now it's only parts."

2017 really was the year of 3D printers, he said.

Suffield had originally thought about building quadcopters for use in farming, but found out he could actually print a quadcopter with a 3D printer. So he bought a 3D printer kit from a manufacturer in China, for around \$200.

The build plate on Suffield's printer is large enough to make a variety of small tools for use in his office. He has made a desk top waste bin, organizers for tools and electronic components, an articulating arm to hold his cell phone, and other items.

He said the desk top phone holder took 50 minutes to build. The tiny gear he made for this reporter took only a couple of minutes.

First Suffield made accurate measurements of the computer-generated gear, which were then sent to a "slicer" where .2 mm of the image were recorded. After making sure his measurements were correct, Suffield pressed print.

The printer first drew a 2D picture on the build plate. Plastic, made with eco-friendly cornstarch, was fed into the printer and the gear began to take shape,

from the bottom up, on the heated build plate. The gear took form using a process of continuous melting. Suffield compared the action to that of a glue gun.

When the gear was finished it was slightly fused to the build plate, and Suffield pried it off with a tool he made on the 3D printer, especially for that purpose.

Suffield said build plates and scaffolding on the printers come in various sizes and shapes. He pointed to a picture of a 3D printer on the computer, having no structure or build plate. It simply hangs by strings and "can literally turn a room into a printer", he said.

Suffield said some build plates are as large as a person.

While 3D printers can make toys and other fun items, Suffield said he is most excited to see useful applications for them.

For instance, 3D printers are currently being used to create prostheses for patients without limbs, he said. "It's customized," said Suffield. "It's a perfect fit."

Suffield said the cost of 3D printers is under \$300, and the plastic filament is around 20-30 dollars a spool, making 3D printing easily affordable.

Of course there is the cost of the software; some of it is free, and some isn't, he said.

"This is an outgrowth of the times, we are in," Suffield said. "It will be interesting in the next couple of years to see how this matures."

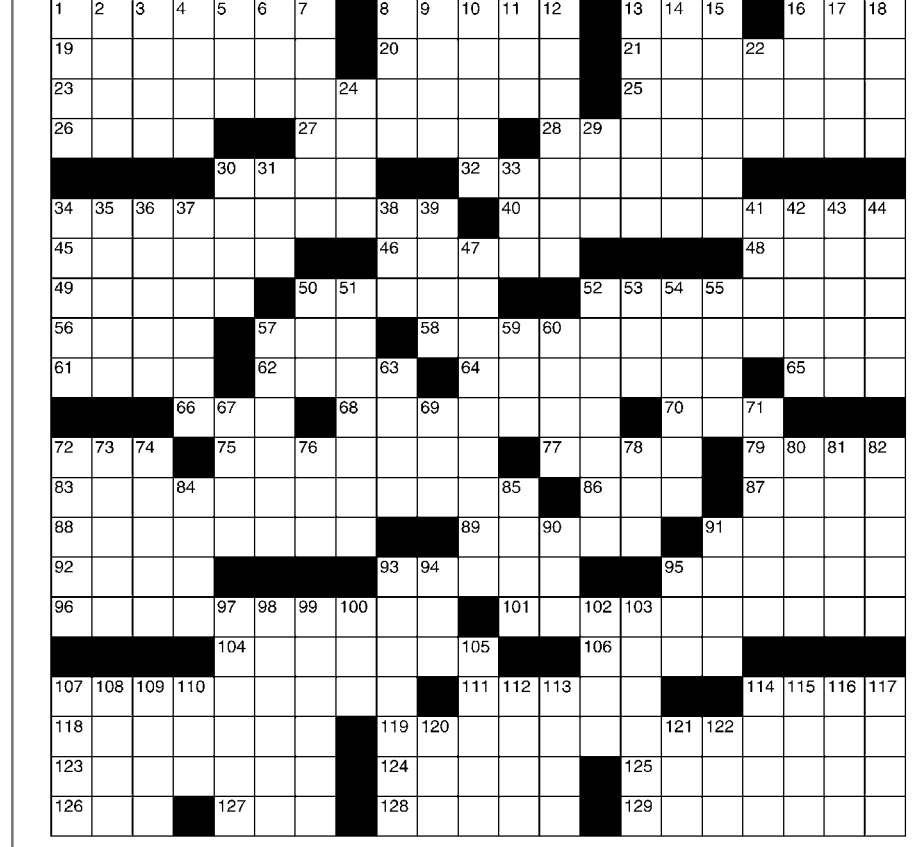

This recipe comes from Big Birds Busy Book, which came out in the ‘70’s and the same time my 2 young sons watched Sesame Street. I have made this recipe numerous times and it’s my “go to” sugar cookie recipe. The dough is soft, rich, and sweet. Some sugar cookies are crisp, but not this one. I am currently making heart shaped cookies to freeze for



Valentine’s Day. I am doubling the recipe so that I can make and send them to those same sons, a tradition not to be broken©

INGREDIENTS:

- ¾ cup margarine or butter—that’s a stick and half
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 eggs, slightly beaten
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 2 ½ c. all-purpose flour
- 1 tsp baking powder
- 1 tsp salt

INSTRUCTIONS: (as written)

- Put ¾ cup of butter or margarine into your mixing bowl
- Measure 1 cup sugar
- Pour sugar over butter
- With fork, squash butter and sugar together until they are blended
- Crack shells of two eggs and pour eggs over mixture in bowl
- Measure 1 teaspoon vanilla and pour over mixture in bowl
- With fork, blend everything in the bowl together
- Measure 2 ½ cups all-purpose flour and pour over mixture in bowl
- Measure 1 teaspoon baking powder and sprinkle over flour
- Measure 1 teaspoon of salt and sprinkle over flour and baking powder
- Mix everything together either with the fork or with your hands
- Put dough in icebox to chill (at least one hour)
- Roll out cookies, ¼ inch thick, sprinkle with sugar, and bake at 350 degrees for 8-10 minutes

MY NOTES:

If you wanted to Google this recipe, you could see how it was written with all the pictures. The original picture recipe did not have temperature and time so someone added that. I like to watch the cookies and bake them until “set”, so maybe not the full 10 minutes. I think baking a test cookie would be a good idea, so you can decide.

It is written so that a child could do this, but I used a blender until I needed to add the dry ingredients.

Oh, and I don’t sprinkle with sugar, as I will frost with red and white frosting. ENJOY©
