WAITSBURG—"What it about this piece of that offends That question inspired Joseph Roberts' decision to start a monthly discussion called Art Talk. Roberts and Tiina Jaatinen are the team that founded the hotel and wine bar Royal Block in downtown Waitsburg.

The high ceilings and gallery lighting make the space perfect for displaying artwork from Robert's extensive art collection.

"Encouraging artists to strive on their path was one of the reasons that led me to collect art," Roberts said.

According to Roberts, his intent in displaying and rotating the art displayed at Royal Block is to bring people from different viewpoints together – not to – try to change minds.

Art Talks began after a guest said Roberts should take a piece of art down because it was offensive.

Roberts said, "Instead of automatically defending it, I asked her to explain what offended her about the piece of art. What made her see the artwork as offensive?'

Art Talk's inaugural session was held in the event room at the back of the wine bar on Saturday, March 2. About 20 people came to hear Roberts talk about "Three Moments," a large print by photographer Chris Engman.

Roberts gave a bit of background on why he chose Engman's piece for his collection and as the first Art Talk subject. He then opened the discussion to audience members to share their observations.

As an interesting side note, Roberts said "Three Moments" is an edition of only six prints, and Elton John owns one of the other

One of these is to revamp the children's picture book section located on the library's lower level. Right now, the books are filed by the author's last name, on shelves too tall to be user-friendly for the youngest "readers." She plans to purchase shorter shelves and organize the books by subject, placing them in bins with the book covers facing out. This arrangement will

make them more open to exploration, she explained. She also plans for some adult-size furniture for the lower level, including a study carrel so parents can sit or work on the computer while their kids are occupied.

Brigham also wants to invite speakers from the Washington Humanities Bureau and local authors to share their areas of expertise with the public. Additionally, she will offer more craft programs and looks forward to partnering more closely with the local schools to help fill gaps where their library collections are a little thin or out of date.

Though attacks over challenged material in the collection are fewer, Brigham was recently targeted by someone using her identity to fill out a form at an entertainment company to book a drag queen for storytime. The new director immediately informed the Columbia County Sheriff's Office about the situa-

"I only found out when the drag queen entertainment company emailed me saying, 'Thanks for filling out our form, un-

fortunately no drag queens are available'. ' To her it seemed like a ploy to get people up in arms.

"That kind of rabblerousing is not conducive to a good society. If people have issues with the library, they are free to come and talk with me," she said.

Brigham grew up in Walla Walla. Her father was the administrator of the Washington Odd Fellows home, and her mother was the Music Librarian at Whitman College. Both are retired now. She has one sibling, a brother, who lives in Seattle.

Civility Café comes to Dayton to talk about books in libraries

DAYTON—The Friends of Dayton Memorial Library is hosting an innovative evening of conversation on Thursday, March 7, from 6:45 p.m. to 9 p.m. Set up in a café setting, the event for Columbia County residents will be held at the Columbia County Fairgrounds Pavilion in Dayton.

The topic of the evening's discussion will be "Books in Libraries," exploring the challenges facing the public and school libraries in Columbia County. The Walla Walla Civility Project (WWCP) will provide the format and facilitate the event designed to enhance personal and community civility in the

The WWCP held a similar event in Walla Walla on September 27, 2023, at the Walla Walla High School Commons. Dayton resident Tanva Patton attended the Walla Walla Community Civility Café and described the event as well-structured, intentional, and thoughtful. There was no agenda in facilitating the conversations: it was not about changing people's minds or problem-solving.

Patton said, "I came away feeling refreshed. The questions about books in libraries were a vehicle to help people practice how to speak to one another." She said one of the questions was, "How do you balance moral education and intellectual freedom; are both important?'

Patton felt there was a good cross-section of opinions at the

event. At the Dayton event, participants will form smaller groups, seated at tables where hosts from WWCP will aid discussions to one of three questions about books in libraries. The hosts will help draw out speakers, promote listening, and ensure anyone who wishes to speak can. After fifteen minutes, the participants will break into new groups, move to a new table, and discuss the next question.

Following the three 15-minute sessions, the hosts will take two minutes to synthesize what they heard at their table for all three questions. Patton said the hosts at the event in Walla Walla used the two minutes to pull out salient descriptions in a succinct manner.

The Friends of the Dayton Memorial Library hope this exercise in civility will help the community to come together, speak peacefully, respectfully, and listen.

"Dune: Part Two"

DAYTON—The saga continues with an expanded all-star international ensemble cast. This movie, is the highly anticipated follow-up to 2021's six-time Academy Award-winning "Dune." This big-screen epic continues the adaptation of Frank Herbert's acclaimed bestseller Dune with returning and new stars, including Timothée Chalamet, Zendaya, Rebecca Ferguson, Josh Brolin, Austin Butler, Florence Pugh, and many other well-known actors.

"Dune: Part Two" will explore the mythic journey of Paul Atreides as he unites with Chani and the Fremen while on a warpath of revenge against the conspirators who destroyed his family. Facing a choice between the love of his life and the fate of the known universe, he endeavors to prevent a terrible future only he can foresee.

Rotten Tomatoes critics give this movie a 98% favorable, but there are no audience reviews available yet. That website's critics summarized their reviews with "Visually thrilling and narratively epic," which continues the "adaptation of the beloved sci-fi series in spectacular form." This movie is rated PG-13 for sequences of strong violence, some suggestive material and brief strong language. The IMDb parent's guide only has comments regarding violence and gore, "More violence and gruesome images than the first film. Nothing too graphic but pretty strong for PG-13." Another comment there was "Definitely more than the first, but still very clearly PG-13, and isn't that frightening." It has a runtime of 2 hours and 46 minutes.



LIBRARY MEMORIES

To the Editor,

When I was a child, the Dayton Memorial Library was a place my friends and I were always welcome. My father, an avid reader and well-respected schoolteacher, often requested books from that library to read, for pleasure or as resources for his lessons. Like my friends, my father, and me, members of the whole community drew on that splendid resource to enrich our lives. If we couldn't find something we needed, the librarian, Ms. Weatherford, would help us, thereby expanding the library's usefulness. The same was true for my wife, who grew up in the Ballard section of Seatle and made use of her neighborhood's public library.

When I graduated from Dayton High School, I went on to graduate from Whitman College, and, after serving my country, to graduate school. After I got my PhD, I spent a long and fruitful career teaching at the Johnstown Campus of the University of Pittsburgh, so my life has been devoted to educating others, as were those of my father and mother, Clarence and Lula McNair.

My successful educational career began in Dayton, and I owe a great deal of my success to time spent in that Public Library. For others, many of whom remained in or around Dayton, that library has continued to provide resources for self-betterment (books, periodicals, computers, etc.) that would not have otherwise been available to them. Now, a few sanctimonious inhabitants of the area, ignoring the benefits of the library to the entire community, are again seeking to impose their narrow and short-sighted values on everyone else by forcing the withdrawal of the library's support. Shame on them!

According to historian Jon Meacham, one of the most important lessons for citizens of our two-party dominated democracy in the United States is that each citizen loses about half the time, and civility demands that we all become good losers. The community has spoken and the courts have spoken, and yet I'm told that these self-righteous and self-appointed "guardians of democracy and the public good" are at it again. Perhaps, if they had spent more time in the library, they would have learned Meacham's important lesson.

Othello Sandhill Crane Festival coming March 22

OTHELLO-A weekend getaway to the Columbia National Wildlife Refuge and the nearby town of Othello offered solitude under big skies, vibrant sunsets, and subtle sunrises. Fields of honking geese are a reminder that the 26th Annual Othello Sandhill Crane Festival on March 22 – 24, 2024, is just around the corner.

The three-day event offers lectures, photography workshops, guided tours by bus, boats, and bikes (bring your own bike), and walking and hiking through the Columbia National Wildlife Refuge (CNWR) and Potholes State Park. The lectures cover the Sandhill Cranes migration route from the California Central Valley to Alaska via the Pacific Flyway with a stopover in Othello. Other topics on local geological history include the Ice Age Megafloods and the Shrubsteppe ecosystem.

Though close enough to Waitsburg for an eventfilled day trip, I recommend staying overnight.

Catching a sunrise or sunset in the CNWR makes for a spectacular, light-filled landscape. Camping is available at Potholes State Park and private RV Parks. There is limited primitive (outhouses, no water) camping in the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife Seep Lakes Area, where signage indicates. Remember, a Washington State Discover Pass is needed if you are venturing onto state lands.

Online registration for camping is recommended (they provide waitlisting) for specific events; a \$12 fee per person is required at the entrance. Bring comfortable hiking shoes, warm layered clothing (check the weather), water, binoculars, a keen eye, and a sense of adventure!

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Gnocchi with Braised Chard and Peas

As spring green colors are finally popping up in our yard, I found myself craving tender green flavors. Rainbow chard braised with aromatics in stock and wine, is a favorite side dish that I love to prepare throughout the year. Here, the addition of potato gnocchi and sweet peas turns the braised greens into a delightful main course. For serving, a dollop of ricotta cheese adds a luscious creaminess, while fresh lemon zest and juice adds brightness.



Ingredients:

4 tablespoon unsalted butter

- 3 leeks, white and light green parts, sliced into thin half-moons
- 1 pound chard (about 2 bunches), stems thinly sliced and leaves coarsely chopped
- 3 garlic cloves, minced
- 2 teaspoons fresh thyme leaves, chopped
- Salt and fresh ground black pepper
- 3/4 cup dry white wine
- 3 cups chicken stock
- 1 pound potato gnocchi, see notes
- 2 cups peas, fresh or frozen
- 2 tablespoons fresh tarragon, chopped
- Zest of one lemon
- Pinch of crushed red pepper flakes
- Fresh parsley leaves, chopped
- Grated Parmesan, for serving
- Lemon wedges, for serving
- Fresh whole-milk ricotta, for serving (optional)

Directions:

In a heavy bottomed pot or Dutch-oven, melt the butter over medium-high heat. Add the leeks and the chard stems, and cook, stirring occasionally, until tender, about 8 to 10 minutes. As they cook, the vegetables will release a lot of moisture and then begin to lightly brown. Stir in the garlic, thyme, and season with a pinch of salt and black pepper. Sauté until the garlic is fragrant, about 1 minute. Next, add the wine, scraping up the browned bits from the bottom of the pot, and cook until the wine is reduced by half, about 4 minutes. Pour in the stock and another pinch of salt, then bring to a simmer.

Stir in the gnocchi and chard leaves. Reduce heat to maintain a steady, gentle simmer. Cook, partially covered, until the chard is tender, about 15 minutes. Next, add the peas and tarragon, and continue to cook, partially covered, until the gnocchi is very tender, about 5 to 10 minutes. Take off the heat and stir in the lemon zest and crushed pepper flakes. Taste and adjust seasoning, adding more salt and pepper as needed.

Serve in bowls topped with parsley, Parmesan and a squeeze of lemon juice. If using, also serve with a dollop of ricotta on top.

For this recipe, look for rainbow chard or red stemmed chard. Wash the chard and then remove the leafy part from the stems. Thinly slice the chard stems and coarsely chop or tear the leaves. The stems are cooked first with the leeks, and the leaves are added

You can find shelf-stable potato gnocchi in grocery stores next to dried pasta. They are a wonderful pantry staple for quick weeknight meals. Sometimes you can also find frozen fresh gnocchi in some specialty markets, just make sure they are not frozen in a sauce. If you are feeling ambitious, making homemade gnocchi is a satisfying and fairly simple recipe usually made with potatoes, flour, egg, and salt. Currently, I am testing a couple and might include a recipe in a future column.

You could easily substitute vegetable stock to make this an elegant vegetarian meal. Alternatively, you could add some browned pancetta or crumbled sausage to make a meatier version. I would brown the meat first, remove with a slotted spoon and then use the drippings to cook the leeks and stems. Depending on the amount of the drippings, you might need to still add some butter to the pan. Then return the meat at the same time as the chard leaves.


