WAITSBURG — One of the elective courses available this year at the Waitsburg School District is performing arts taught by Elizabeth Jagelski. The class opened to sophomores and welcomed five students this semester. They recently performed their first skit, an abbreviated version of Cinderella, for elementary students.

- 1. Get a replacement ballot by mail on the website. Be sure to give enough time to receive the replacement to meet the election return deadlines.
- 2. Print and mail back a replacement ballot. Choose this option if it's too close to election day to get a new ballot mailed to you and you have access to a printer.
- 3. If getting a replacement ballot by mail or printing will not work, you can pick up a replacement ballot in person at a voting center on election day.

Printing or requesting a replacement will automatically cancel the previous ballot.

Ballots can be mailed, postmarked be dropped of at drop boxes 24 hours a day, until 8 p.m. on November 5.

"White Bird"

DAYTON — In the movie "White Bird," kindness has the power to save lives, as Julian Albans, the bully who left Beecher Prep, is visited by his Grandmère from Paris and is transformed by her remarkable story of compassion and courage. As a girl in Nazi-occupied France, the young Grandmère goes into hiding with the help of a schoolmate, a young man who risks everything to give her the chance to survive. Together, they find beauty and love in the secret world of their own creation. From Marc Forster (director of Finding Neverland and Christopher Robin) and based on R.J. Palacio's book, 'White Bird', like 'Wonder' before it, is an emotional story about the ways that even in the most harrowing circumstances, empathy for others can make every difference in the world.

White Bird has a favorable rating of 72% from critics, while the audience rates it higher at 99% on Rotten Tomatoes. The critics consensus is that this movie packages a difficult subject matter into a digestible morality tale. White Bird is a soft-pedaled but ultimately moving drama fit for the whole family. This movie is rated PG-13 for strong violence, thematic material and language, however the the rating indicators on IMDb were none or mild for each of the categories. The movie runtime is 121 min.

The live performance of "Fiddler on the Roof" will run November 14 – December 7. Tickets are on sale online at libertytheater.org, by phone, and in person at the theater during Box Office Hours Tuesdays and Fridays from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m.

LYONS FERRY PARK CLOSED **DUE TO ALGAE BLOOM**


LYONS FERRY — Washington State Parks has closed the swim beach at Lyons Ferry State Park due to the presence of blue-green algae. Algae is at its worst between September and October according to the state health department. The closure includes swimming, water skiing, and other water sports.

The park service warns pet owners to not let animals drink the water as the algae is toxic to pets and people. The park ranger on duty at the park over the weekend of October 19, said that a dog can die within six hours after drinking the water. She also advised park visitors to wear gloves when handling fish.

Microcystin is the toxin produced by cyanobacteria, also known as blue-green algae. On that weekend, the microcystin level from the algae bloom was 140 micrograms per liter. The Washington State Department of Health advises that the safe level for recreational water is 6 mg/L. Not all algae blooms produce toxins but there is no visible way to know. The water may look clear and inviting but visitors to the park should check for warning signs posted before entering during the algae bloom season.



Richard Barry Ford

May 7, 1943 – October 10, 2024

ichard Barry Ford, known affectionately to many as Papa Rich, left this world unexpectedly on October 10, 2024. Though it is comforting to know he is in Heaven where there is no suffering but pure Joy in the presence of the LORD, our sorrow is great. The "Old Man" will be greatly missed and never forgotten.

Our loving dad, husband, grandfather, and friend will be remembered for many things, one is his positive attitude. He woke up happy nearly every morning, saying, "Good morning, day!"

Rich Ford was a principled man who taught us that honesty was highly prized. He passed his principles and work ethic to his children and grandchildren. A bit of a perfectionist, he also taught us that if you don't have time to do the job right the first time, you definitely don't have time to do it twice.

Rich was also known for his famous quotes we called "Richardisms." And there is a whole bunch of them. He was a whole lotta fun and quite the practical joker. We could write a book filled with his hilarious pranks.

Maybe not wealthy by the world's standards, Richard Ford was extremely wealthy in other ways, including the legacy he left through his six children and his beloved grandchildren. To quote someone he greatly admired, Paul Harvey, "And now here's the rest of the story."

"Richie," as his older sisters called him, was born May 7, 1943, in Escanaba, Michigan, to Marvin and Marianna Ford. He grew up on a UP (Upper Peninsula dairy farm.) He shared stories of so much snow that they had tunnels from the house to the barns. When he was seven, he and his parents and older brother Roger moved to a dairy farm in the Poe Valley, outside of Klamath Falls, Oregon. His two older married sisters, Elaine Jenson and Gerry Thornton, remained in Michigan and Wisconsin. After his mother suddenly died when Richard was in high school, he went to live with his brother and sisterin-law Pat.

An independent teen, he moved to his own apartment at 16 and worked full-time at Weisfield's in Klamath Falls while finishing high school at Klamath Union. Then, he met a pretty gal living across the street who just happened to have the same last name, even though they were NOT related. Betty Jo and Rich married in 1963 and welcomed their firstborn daughter, Marlee, in 1964. Eleven months later came Cheryl, and they were blessed with Gregory five years later.

Richard worked as an electrician for Weyerhaeuser until 1970. As the story goes, he and his brother Roger could whoop any of the 4,000 employees who dared to arm wrestle them. Years later, Richard arm wrestled in Northern California and Oregon, winning or placing in several big tournaments, including the Northern California Heavyweight Championship in 1974 and the Oregon State Championship.

In 1970, Rich and his young family moved to Yreka, California, where he was hired by Pacific Power & Light as a high-voltage electrician. It didn't take him long to be promoted to Wireman Working Fore-

man, a position he held until he retired at 54, in Walla Walla, Washington.

Life is not always perfect; Richard and Betty Jo divorced after nearly 20 years of marriage. Looking to start fresh, Rich and Janice relocated to Washington State, eventually ending up in Waitsburg, happily living in the house they built on Caroline St. How they built their home speaks volumes about the kind of man he was. Who builds a home designed for entertaining their grandchildren? Papa Rich, that's who. The three-story house has built-in baby gates, a basketball hoop, a huge sandbox with a water faucet, Tonka trucks, and shovels. Papa Rich loved to spend time with his grandkids, and it wasn't unusual for him to take five or more of them to the couple's cabin on his own for several days.

One summer several years ago, a bunch of the grandsons asked for Mohawk haircuts; guess who else got one? Yep, you got it, Papa Rich. Kids spell love T-I-M-E, and Papa Rich gave his grandkids an incredible amount of love.

Richard is survived by his loving wife & partner of 42 years Janice, his children; Marlee (Scott) Billingsley of Yreka, Calif., Cheryl (Jesse) Gonzalez of Spring Creek, Nev., Greg (Amy) Ford of Kennewick, Wash., Aaron (Leah) Trent of Benton City, Wash., Kim (JC) Picton of Kennewick, Wash., and Kavlyn (Daryl) Rutherford of Waitsburg, Wash. Papa Rich was the proud Grandfather of 20: Jace (Alyssa), Blake (McKenzie), Scotty (Emily), Gage, Elaina, Brooklyn, Bryce, Addisen, Gabriella, Garrett, Colton, Ben, Lauryn, Annie, Michael, Jonathan, Lucas, Alexa (Eman), Ryder, and Brody. His legacy continues as the Great-Grandfather of seven: Sophia, Belimy, Luke, Leytin, Pierce, Adalee, and Adriel.

INNOVIA AWARDS \$6K THROUGH COLUMBIA COUNTY CHILDREN'S FUND

Spokane — The Columbia County Children's Fund at Innovia is awarding grants totaling \$6,000 to organizations serving youth in Columbia County. The grantees selected were Touchet Valley Arts Council, Tri-State Steelheaders, and LaunchNW.

"Ensuring that children have access to exceptional education and extracurricular activities is essential to creating vibrant and sustainable communities," says Nolan Glueckert, Regional Engagement Manager of the Southern Region at Innovia Foundation. "Innovia is partnering with the Columbia County Children's Fund grant program to provide educational experiences and opportunities to children in Columbia County."

The CCCF awarded The Touchet Valley Arts Council a \$1,000 grant to support its Summer Cultural Enrichment Program (SCEP). The program includes a summer film series for families, free theater education, and the opportunity to participate in a live theater production in partnership with the Missoula Children's Theatre. Community members can attend the performance at a reduced cost.

The Tri-State Steelheaders received \$4,000 from the fund for their Salmon in School 24-25 initiative. The program educates students and the community on the importance of salmon to our regional economy and culture. Salmon in School provides classrooms with salmon eggs, allowing students to observe the early stages of the life cycle before releasing them into local streams in the spring.

LaunchNW received a \$1,000 grant to support high school students in Columbia County through the Columbia County LaunchNW Scholarship Fund. The fund will benefit students attending Dayton High School, helping them to reach their posthigh school educational goals and meet their full potential.







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MY RECIPES

German Meat Rolls (Rouladen)

I was taught how to make Rouladen by two different elderly German ladies. The recipes were quite different. This recipe combines the best of both methods, and is how I prepare it for special occasions. Serves 4



Ingredients:

- 8 slices thin-sliced top or bottom beef round, pounded to 1/8–1/4 inch thick, 5 - 6 inches per side (trim off fat/gristle.) Note: all dimensions cited in this recipe are approximate.
- Hot or mild Jimmy Dean sausage, rolled into 3/8-inch-thick, 5-inchlong pieces, then frozen until firm
- 1 package Lipton's Onion Soup Mix
- Dijon mustard (I've never tried the yellow stuff in this recipe, but I think it would be awful)
- Fresh ground black pepper
- 1-2 packages gelatin, bloomed in 1-2 T. warm water
- 1–2 large shallots, finely chopped
- 1-2 carrots, sliced lengthwise into 3/8-inch wide, 5-inch-long square strips
- Whole dill pickles, sliced lengthwise into 3/8-inch wide, 5-inch-long square strips
- 1 cup sour cream
- 2 cups red wine (Cabernet or Merlot)

Directions:

- 1. Meat and sausage preparation: Roll the sausage into 3/8-inch-thick, 5-inch-long pieces and freeze ahead of time to prevent "oozing" when forming the rolls in step 5.
- Use thin-sliced top or bottom round with minimal fat and gristle. Gen-2. tly pound each slice with the rough side of a meat hammer to tenderize, then use the flat side to spread the pieces to 1/8-1/4-inch thickness. Trim to about 5-6 inches per side. Don't
- overdo the pounding. 3. Prepare rolls: Lay each slice of meat flat and spread about 2 tsp. of Dijon mustard over the surface. Sprinkle with freshly ground black pepper.
- 4. About 1 inch from one edge of each meat slice, lay a line of about 2 tsp minced shallot and lay carrot and pickle strips on top of shallots. Then, place a frozen sausage roll on top of the carrot and pickle.
- 5. Starting from the end of the meat with the fillings, roll the meat up tightly. Bind each end with fine cotton twine to prevent them from unrolling during cooking.
- 6. Cook rolls: Place the rolls on a wire rack placed on a rimmed, non-stick baking sheet. Bake at 350°F for 20 minutes to set the rolls and lightly brown the exterior.
- While the meat rolls are baking, combine 2 cups water, 2 cups red wine, 7. and the Lipton's onion soup mix in a Dutch oven or similar heavy, oven-ready pot with a lid.
- Remove the rolls from the oven and place them in the Dutch oven, add-8. ing drippings from the baking sheet. Reduce oven to 325°F, cover the Dutch oven, and bake for 45-60 minutes. Move the rolls around halfway through the baking cycle to ensure each one is in contact with the liquid at some point during braising. After 45 minutes, check tenderness by slicing the end of one roll; if chewy, cook for another 15 minutes.
- 9. Remove the meat rolls, snip off the twine, and set aside. Set aside half of the braising liquid. Pour the remaining liquid into a frying pan, simmer, and reduce by half. Then add softened gelatin and stir until fully



- dissolved.
- 10. Whisk in 1/2 cup sour cream at a time into the thickened liquid, thinning with the reserved braising liquid if necessary until it reaches a creamy, gravy-like consistency—not too thick or thin.
- 11. Return the meat rolls to the Dutch oven, pour the sauce over the meat, cover, and place back in the oven at 300 for 10-15 minutes to return it to serving temperature. Serve with spaetzle, curly pasta, or latkes, and a side of red cabbage. Enjoy!

A tasty red cabbage side

Ingredients:

1 medium thinly sliced red cabbage 1 sauteed chopped apple 1 sauteed chopped onion

1/3 cup of sugar

³⁄₄ tsp salt ¹/₄ tsp pepper Dash of ground cloves

1/3 cup of white vinegar

Directions:

Combine all the ingredients in a Dutch oven.

Bake at 325°, stirring occasionally, until tender – about one hour.
