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Jim Pearson is Ready to Launch 'The Club'

NEW PROGRAM DIRECTOR IS ADDING STAFF AND MAKING PLANS FOR SEPT. 4 OPENING

DAYTON—Jim Pearson, Program Director at The Club, Dayton's new after school activity center, has been busy helping the team get the program up and running for a Sept. 4 opening.

Pearson said building construction at The Club has entered its final phase. "Last week a lot of elements have come together," he said.

Pearson said the goals for the program are to help students take pride in ownership, develop healthy self-esteem, and learn how to get along well with others.

While students will receive help with homework, Pearson said the emphasis will be on child-centered, project-based learning, he said.

"We don't want this to be just another four hours of school," he said.

Because of his experience with Dan Butler, The Club's co-founder, at an alternative school in Dayton over 20 years ago, Pearson said he is clear-eyed about much of what will be required of him in his role as The Club's Program Director.

He said he saw the value of working with kids in a nurturing and respectful way while at the alternative school.

Nylah Holt and Kolbie Rodriguez have recently been hired at The Club. Holt has a

degree in International Relations from the University of Idaho. She has recently returned from Morocco, where she taught English as a Second Language at the American Language Center.

Pearson said Holt's background fell in precisely with what is needed at The Club as program leader.

While the Membership Coordinator position has been filled by Rodriguez, there

are two positions remaining to be filled. "We want the best people in place," he said.

The Club also needs volunteers, and Pearson said he was happy about the numbers of people at the open house who asked how they can help.

Pearson wants kids to have positive experiences at The Club, and for word to get out to the greater community.

Waitsburg, Dayton Receive Public Works Board Loans

FUNDS ARE FOR TAGGERT ROAD UTILITIES IN WAITSBURG AND WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANT IN DAYTON

OLYMPIA - The Washington State Public Works Board last week awarded \$5,430,540 in pre-construction loans to 10 cities, counties and water districts throughout the state, including Waitsburg and Dayton. According to a news release, this is just the second time in five years the Board has had funding available to issue low-interest loans for public infrastructure improvements to roads, water, sanitary sewer and street systems.

Waitsburg will receive \$90,000 for water and sewer line extensions along Taggart Road. The new loan funds will pay for the utility work prior to the upcoming road project.

As The Times reported recently, the Waitsburg City Council approved the project to bring Taggart Road straight through from Millrace Road to Highway 12 and provide sewer and water for future development.

Waitsburg City Council Member KC Kuykendall also serves on the Board of Directors for the Association of Washington Cities, as well as the State Public Works Board, which awarded the loans.

The City of Dayton received \$1 million dollars for acquisition of land for its new wastewater treatment facility. Last month, City Administrator Trina Cole reported to the city council that repayment of the loan will be built into the city's utility rate structure, which could be spread over as little as five years, or up to 20 years.

Mayor Craig George reported to the council earlier this year that the total cost of the wastewater treatment plant could be as much as \$13 million. The State Dept. of Ecology has asked the city to complete project design by the end of next year. Construction is expected to be completed by 2022.

Ten Years Ago-August 14, 2008

Huntsville Memories from the late Margaret Ganguet: "I remember all our walks to Huntsville school (about 1923). I started there in the Fourth Grade after Pendleton and Walla Walla boarding schools. Now the kids wouldn't think of walking two miles to school. We used to get disgusted when a car passed by and didn't offer us a ride! Nowadays we wouldn't dare get in a car if we didn't know the people. In winter when we had snow, my father hitched up the team and took us to school in the sled."

Originally called the Washington Institute and founded by the United Brethren Church, the seminary operated in Huntsville from the inception in 1879 into the Twentieth Century, and drew folks to the valley bottom from Waitsburg where they erected a mill and established homes. EXTENSION DIRECTOR PAUL CARTER RECEIVES DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn. – Paul Carter, WSU Columbia County Extension Director, received special recognition from the National Association of County Agricultural Agents (NACAA) at its Annual Meeting in Chattanooga, Tenn., on Aug. 2. Carter received NACAA's Distinguished Service Award for the work he has done during his 13 years of service as a Washington State University Extension Educator in Columbia County. He is also Extension Regional Specialist in Soils, Crops and Precision Agriculture and holds the rank of Associate Professor with WSU.

Summer Update from City of Waitsburg

The City of Waitsburg does not have a Facebook account and does not participate in social media in any format. Should any citizen have a concern or know of a situation that warrants the city's involvement, please contact City Hall directly rather than posting complaints and comments online. If we don't know about the issues, we can't address them, and simply posting online will not help solve any problems.

While it might not be the fastest process, sometimes taking up to a month, the city does have procedures in place to address a great number of nuisances. The city doesn't go looking for problems; instead, we rely on citizens telling us about issues so that we can address them properly. When something is reported, we generally try to contact the property owner directly by phone, or we send a letter out the same or next business day the issue is reported to us.

If you haven't seen them by now, please be aware that there is a crew of employees doing meter replacements throughout Waitsburg. The crew has made it through about half of the meter replacements so far and is projected to be done by late September/early October.

Be advised that the new water meters are extremely accurate in comparison to the old meters. Properties where the oldest meters were installed will now most likely show more consumption due to the fact that the old meters were slowing down, allowing water to go through unmetered. Due to all of that unmetered water now being accounted for, you might notice more consumption than you're used to on your utility bill. We try to be proactive in confirming meter readings before the bills get mailed, but we don't catch them all! We rely on customers alerting us to abnormal readings, as they know their own consumption better than anyone. As soon as we are notified of a potential misread, we take a new reading to confirm or refute the original reading. Through this process, we can also check to see if there is a potential water leak, and we can let the customer know if that might be an issue as well.

In closing, puncture vine continues to be a high nuisance issue for the City. Should you see a puncture vine (goat head) plant, please spray or pull it to help stop the spread of this noxious weed. Should the plant already have flowers on it and headed out, the best approach to dealing with the plant itself is to dig it up and put it in your trash can.

Five Wishes: A More Personal Advance Directive

DAYTON—Chaplain Terry Rice jump-started a conversation about end of life wishes when he presented "Five Wishes," to folks at the Dayton First Congregational Church, on July 29.

"The best time to plan is when things are going alright. Whether you are 30, or 70, this is a good time to talk," said Rice, who has served with Walla Walla Community Hospice since 2011.

Rice said Five Wishes is the brainchild of Jim Towey, a legal attorney for Mother Teresa. Towey lived in Mother Teresa's Washington DC hospice, he said.

While an Advance Directive covers the medical and legal aspects of end of life care, Five Wishes covers those, as well as emotional and spiritual needs, said Rice.

Rice said, "It takes on the whole person's needs."

Referred to as "America's most popular living will," and legal in 42 states, Five Wishes is an 11-page document that is simple to read and understand and can

be tailored to fit specific requests. It requires only two witness signatures to be legal in Washington State, said Rice.

The Five Wishes are:

The person I want to make care decisions for me when I can't.

The kind of medical treatment I want or don't want.

How comfortable I want to be.

How I want people to treat me.

What I want my loved ones to know.

Rice said he became interested in end of life issues during a two-week rotation in Palliative Care, while at the University of California, San Francisco.

Since receiving a master's degree in divinity, Rice said he has mainly provided pastoral care in institutional health care settings like Providence St. Mary's Hospital.

"The very first day, and first week, we will be getting to know these kids," he said. "We want to be hot out of the gates to engage the kids, right away."

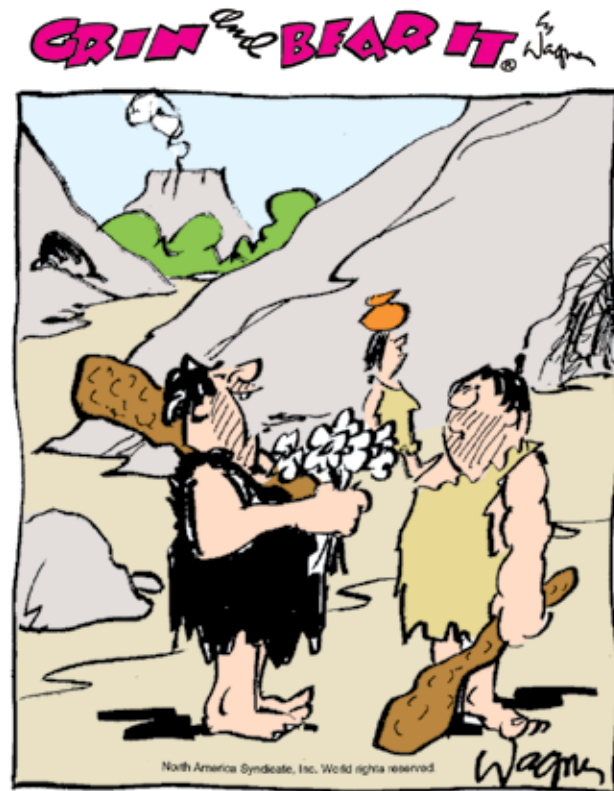

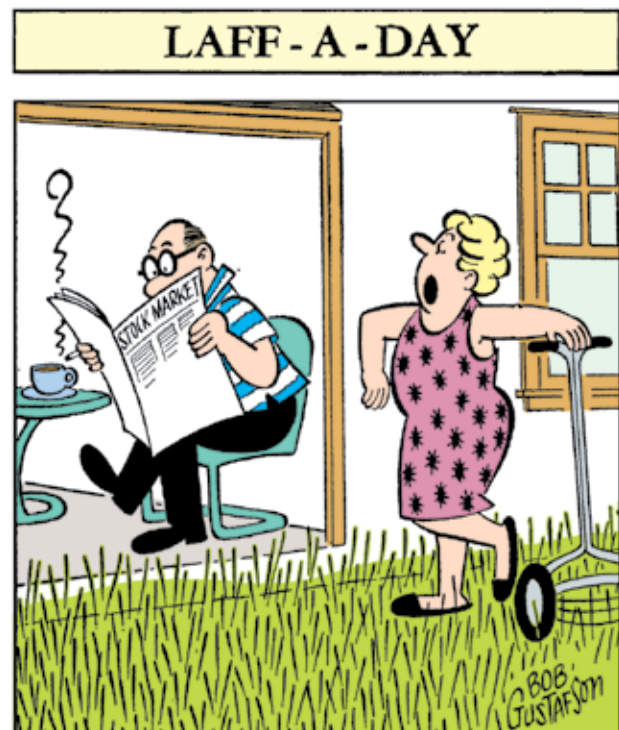

VONDA ANDERSON PROVIDES QUILT-FINISHING SERVICES FOR CUSTOMERS THROUGHOUT NW

DAYTON—Since purchasing the old Dayton Chronicle building at 358 East Main St. in September, Vonda and Mark Anderson have put in long hours, and have used lots of elbow grease, to renovate the building to accommodate their residence and her quilting business.

It took three months to strip everything down to the floor joists and expose the original brick walls, said Vonda Anderson.

During that process a 130-year-old fireplace was discovered on the main level, and another, older stone foundation from the 1800s was discovered beneath the street level, she said.

“The coal shoot was full of coal all the way to the top of the chimney,” she said.

While work continues on the renovations, Anderson has been busy with her longarm quilting business.

The machine she uses at her Dayton shop is computerized, and Anderson said she can download a pattern from 7,000 patterns available to her.

“People make these beautiful tops and bring the top, backing, and quilt to me and I make a giant sandwich. It is like a 14 foot long sewing machine on steroids,” Anderson said, describing the process. “I can accommodate up to King size.”

Anderson said she became interested in quilting while attending a quilting retreat in Lind, Wash., with her mother and sister in 2013.

“My mom and sister are avid quilters. I didn’t have the patience for it. I mostly had U.E.O.s, or unfinished objects,” said Anderson.

She said she tried her hand at a hand driven longarm machine while at the retreat, and she got hooked. “I really enjoyed it,” she said.

Anderson said most of her customers come to her by word of mouth, and many are in Seattle, Walla Walla and Tri-Cities, as well as other places. Each week, she makes a trip to Tri-Cities to get projects from her

customers, or to deliver the finished product to them.

Anderson’s said her turn-around time for quilting is 1-2 weeks.

An Army veteran, Anderson is also making charity quilts, including for the local 4-H Club as well as for veterans, which she does every year.

Anderson said she posts a request on Facebook for stories about why a particular veteran deserves a quilt, and will choose a veteran to receive the quilt, based on the best response. She then sends the quilt to the letter writer, to give to their special veteran.

“I’m starting to work on that, possibly for Veteran’s Day, 2019,” she said.

Anderson also offers a 10% discount on quilts to all ex-military personnel.

Look for free motion quilting classes, and free quilt binding classes in 2019.

“I’m always up at the crack of dawn, and I’m the last one in bed,” she said. “I don’t have retail hours, but I am here 5 days a week and most Saturdays. Just stop by.”

If you’re outside, look up. If you’re inside, look out the window, and up. What do you see?

Sky, hopefully. And probably, somewhere, clouds. 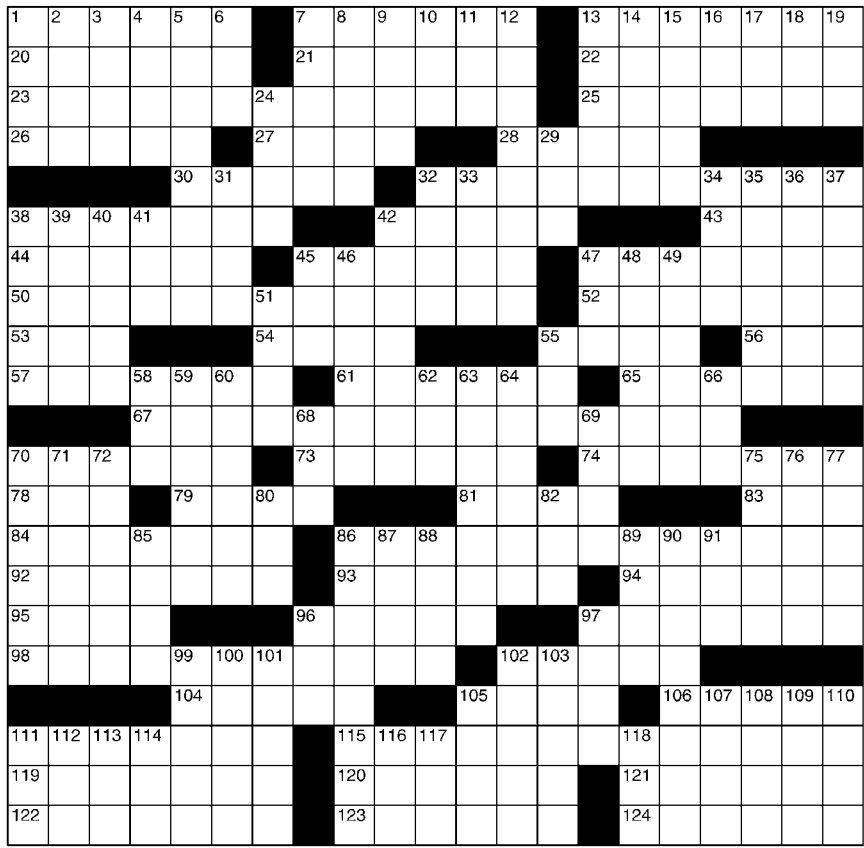

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TEENY MCMUNN: MY RECIPE BOX

Chicken Skillet with Bacon, Brussels Sprouts

Our household seems to be in balance, as I do the desserts and breads and Joe does most of the dinners, if I come up with suggestions. I can spend a few hours making desserts and breads, (instead of dusting), but when it comes to dinner, I just want it done and ready to eat, which is probably why fast food vendors came to be. We often start with what we have in the refrigerator and go from there. We had Brussels sprouts that needed to be used up. For this recipe, I think green beans would make a nice substitute.



I'll write the recipe as is, but Joe made this in a skillet only, not putting it in the oven, and shortened it a bit. It was delicious, but anything with bacon is good!

Most have heard of Penzy's spices; they are online. We were gifted with a box of a variety of spices, which we have been having fun trying. Joe used Galena Street Rib Rub for seasoning.*

INGREDIENTS:

- 6 pieces of bacon, diced
- 4 cloves garlic, minced
- 4 boneless skinless chicken breasts
- 5 cups brussels sprouts, ends cut off and cut into slices
- 1 Tbsp fresh rosemary, chopped
- Salt and pepper
- 2 lemons, cut into slices

INSTRUCTIONS:

Heat a cast iron skillet or other oven-safe pan over medium heat. Cook the diced bacon until it starts to brown, and is just beginning to get crispy on the sides. Remove from the skillet and place on a paper towel-lined plate.

- While the bacon is cooking, chop your brussels sprouts into slices or thin rounds, slice your lemon into rounds. Chop up your garlic and rosemary also.
- Preheat your oven to 400 degrees**
- Sprinkle the chicken with salt and pepper on either side.*When the bacon is done, add garlic to cook for 1-2 minutes, stirring frequently.
- Place chicken directly on top of garlic to brown it on each side. It should take about 5 minutes each side depending on the thickness.
- Once the chicken is browned, add your brussels sprouts and rosemary into the skillet. Sprinkle the bacon on top.
- Season the pan with salt and pepper (if you are putting it in the oven)
- Layer your slices of lemon on top of each chicken
- Bake 25-30 minutes, depending on the size of your chicken breasts, until chicken is cooked thru.

MY NOTES:

We did not use four chicken breasts, but two large ones, and sliced them horizontally so they were not so thick and cooked quicker. We didn't use the garlic and rosemary, as we did not have them, but I think they would make a nice addition. As I mentioned, since it was so warm, we didn't heat the oven, but cooked it longer on the stovetop, until done.

Serve with a nice salad, if desired. It's very flavorful.

TALL GRASS A FIRE HAZARD

DAYTON - With summer heat in full swing, fire risk is increased. City of Dayton Code Compliance Officer Clint Atteberry says he wants to stress to all city residents that tall grass and weeds are a major source of fire fuel, whether they look to be dry or not.

Trimming grasses and weeds to a height of less

than 12 inches does not eliminate fire hazards, but it will reduce them. Over-height grasses may be trimmed more safely with string trimmers than with lawn mowers. Keeping weeds and grasses trimmed not only prevents fires starting, but also prevents the spread of fires.
