WAITSBURG – Plans are falling into place for Waitsburg's fun-filled Celebration Days weekend, May 18-20. The Celebration Days Committee has been working all year to make this celebration the biggest and best yet.

Celebration Days will once again take place on Armed Forces Day, with the theme "Celebrate Waitsburg, the American Way."

In addition to oldie-but-goodie events like the parade, Classic Car Show, Karen's Ride ATV Poker Ride, the sunset cruise, brewfest, and plenty of music, food and dancing, this year's event will feature some fun new activities as well.

Rainier Amusements will set up carnival rides in Preston Park on Friday, and stay in town through the close of Celebration Days weekend on Sunday. A soap box derby, to take place in front of the

City Pool, will add an extra dash of fun to Sunday's festivities.

The weekend will kick off on Friday with the traditional Historic Sunset ATV Cruise, followed by a Bonfire, Brats and Brew at the Waitsburg Fairgrounds. The Historic Sunset Cruise, organized by Andy and Denise Winnet, will cover new territory, with a trek through Bundy Hollow this year.

Meanwhile, everyone is welcome to join in or just observe and appreciate the Auto Cruise, organized by Fred Gonzalez. Old and new vehicles, four wheels or two, are welcome to participate in the cruise that will start at Preston Park and end up at the Fairgrounds bonfire.

The popular Walla Walla acoustic music band BIGfONT will provide entertainment during the bonfire, and The Q will be cooking up brats to accompany beverages at the nearby beer garden.

A partial Saturday lineup includes the breakfast at Town Hall, kiddie and adult parade, Classic Car Show, Waitsburg Brew Fest, the Karen Huwe-Mohney Memorial ATV Poker Ride and Burger, Bands, and Brew.

HEARING TO BE HELD ON COLUMBIA CO. SPEED LIMITS

Speed limit reductions are proposed for primitive roads and steep grades

DAYTON— The Columbia County Commissioners have set a hearing to receive public comment about proposed changes to speed limits on some county roads.

Public Works Director Andrew Woods said the proposal is for the speed limit on all primitive roads in the county, and some roads having steep grades, be set at 35 m.p.h. A reduced speed limit, from 40 m.p.h. to 35 on North Touchet Road, from the Dayton city limits to the South Touchet Road turnoff, is also proposed.

Woods said that about 18 months ago, the commissioners were approached by a group of community members with a request to make roads more ATV friendly, particularly Eckler Mountain Road, North and South Touchet Roads, and Payne's Hollow Road into the mountains.

Woods said that at the time, the commissioners decided other areas where speed limit

changes could be made should be examined. Primitive roads and steep grades were then included.

Primitive roads are those that are narrow, with dirt or gravel, and having short curves, and which are mainly used by farmers and their equipment, he explained. Roads like Hartsock Road which has a steep grade, were also targeted for the 35-m.p.h. speed limit.

Woods said, "On Hartsock, brakes on trailers and RVs are often smoking from driving too fast."

Authorization of temporary speed limit reductions for county maintenance and construction projects is also in the proposal, Woods said. "We need to slow folks down by making safe speeds on roads," he said.

The public hearing is scheduled for 7 p.m. on Monday, April 16, on the third floor of the Columbia County Courthouse. Comments may be sent in writing to Columbia County Public Works Department, PO Box 5, Dayton, WA 99328, no later than the time and date of the hearing.

Whose Water is It?

"It's the most contentious issue we've faced since I've been a commissioner, by far."

That was Walla Walla County Commissioner Todd Kimball, talking about a proposed zoning change to allow water bottling facilities in agricultural-zoned land in the county.

Commissioner Kimball and I met at The Times' office in Waitsburg last week to discuss that contentious issue, and why he and fellow commissioners Jim Johnson and Jim Duncan voted unanimously to allow the Walla Walla Planning Commission to keep that proposal on their list of potential zoning changes for later this year.

Kimball says he talks daily with people who have strong opinions about the proposed zoning change, and a clear majority are opposed.

The revision was proposed by Waitsburg-area farmers Perry and Darlene Dozier. It asks that water bottling facilities be added as an allowed use throughout agricultural zones in Walla Walla County.

Once the planning commission makes its final zoning change recommendations, which will likely occur in the fall, Kimball and his fellow commissioners will have the final say on which are implemented.

If the change is approved, the Doziers plan to pump water from a deep well on their property – for which they own water rights – for their bottling operation. In order to do that, they will be required to convert some of their water right, currently allowed for irrigation, to be used for bottled water. That approval would come from the Washington State Dept. of Ecology. Even if the conversion was approved, the total amount of water the Doziers could pump from the ground would not increase.

Kimball's most important point is that, how the Doziers use the water rights they own is not a county decision.

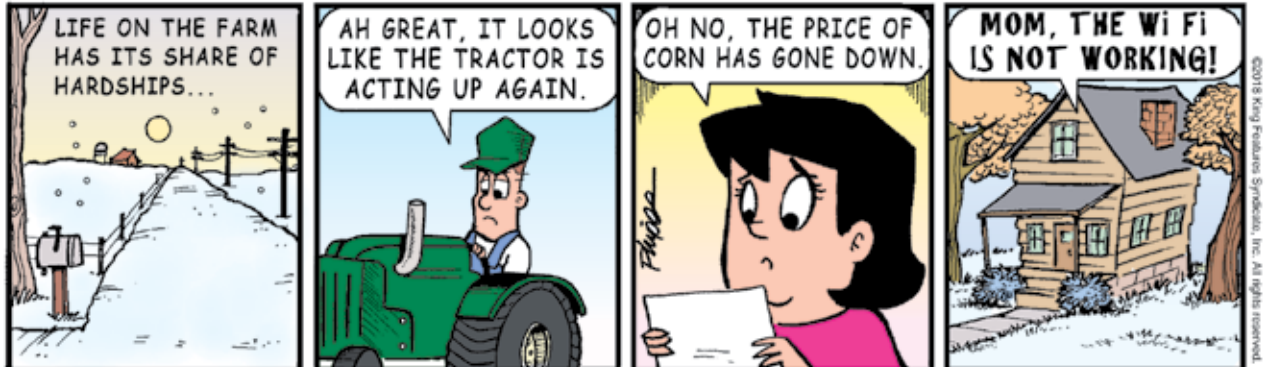

Howard (Jack) Meyers Edmenson, 99, of Dayton, passed away on March 27, 2018.

Howard was born on the breaks of the Lolo River in Idaho, just this side of Weippe, October 27, 1918, to Tallahassee (Jordan) Edmenson and Harvey James Edmenson. The family moved to Weippe in 1920 to start logging in the woods for Potlatch, Cardiff and various other logging companies. Jack left Weippe when he was 18 years old and moved to Dayton, WA, where he worked for George Crall driving truck and then Scott Lumber logging company building roads. One of the roads he built was the road into Touchet Corrals. "A lot of people misunderstand the decision we're being asked to make," Kimball said. "This is strictly a land use issue." He feels that the planning commission and the county commissioners need to focus on the issues related to whether having another industrial-type use on agricultural land is a good idea. The county already allows wineries and distilleries on ag-zoned land.

Kimball says he is not sure whether he will support the change in the end, but that the decision needs to be made after careful study by the planning commission of the land-use issues involved. Even if he does support the revision, he definitely believes that a conditional use permit should be required prior to a water bottling facility being allowed in an ag zone.

Kimball is careful to point out that an important fact gets overlooked by many people who strongly oppose the zoning change: Water bottling is already allowed on industrial-zoned land in Walla Walla County, and has been for years. If a farmer were to convert part of their water right for bottling, they could build a bottling facility in an industrial zone right now, truck the water there, and start bottling.

Kimball says he disagrees with the argument that many people make, that just because the majority of people who have spoken out on the issue are against the proposed zoning change, therefore it's the commissioners' duty to go along with that position. That was the opinion expressed by the Walla Walla Union Bulletin on their editorial page.

"Public opinion can't control what people do with their private property," which is what a water right is, Kimball said. He also pointed out that the people who have spoken out are a small number, compared to the population in the county.

Since Kimball comes from a family of farmers, and I don't, he explained to me briefly how the Dept. of Ecology makes decisions on water right conversions. He said the department generally allows those rights to be converted for what they consider to be "beneficial use." And Ecology considers water bottling to be a "beneficial use." So he believes that a request by the Doziers to convert part of their water right for bottling would likely be approved.

Since we already have a system in place that determines how water can be allocated for agricultural and industrial use, it seems to me that those who believe that the water under Walla Walla County should not be used for bottling need to take that up with the Dept. of Ecology.

Despite what a lot of people appear to think, water bottling is already allowed in the County. So are wineries, breweries and distilleries, which also use lots of water.

Right now, wineries are allowed in agricultural zones in the county. The Doziers are simply asking that water bottling facilities be added to the list of allowed uses in ag zones.

Kimball is right that the planning commission and the county commissioners should be allowed to take the time to address that question on its merits, and not dismiss it up front simply because a lot of people have a problem with the idea of bottled water.

Columbia County Commissioners Hear from Extension Agent Regarding Cutbacks

COUNTY BOARD ALSO ADDRESSED FAIRGROUNDS FEES, HOME REPAIR PROGRAM AT RECENT MEETING

DAYTON—In late March, the Columbia County Commissioners met with WSU Extension Agent Paul Carter, who presented 2017 annual report. “It’s a bleak picture,” Carter said about cuts to WSU’s budgets, and possible regionalization of extension agents.

Columbia County could lose its local extension agent if regionalization of services is put in place by WSU, said Carter. In that case one agent could be serving several counties remotely, Carter said.

He said that despite the uncertain future, “It has been a pretty good year. We focus on the needs of the community, Ag, 4-H, food preservation, and the Weed Board. I think I’ve stayed on top of it.”

Carter said Lorna Barth is the new county 4-H program director in training. Donna Hangar is helping with training.

WSU is now requiring an enrollment fee of \$25 for participation in 4-H activities, and the fee is having an impact on enrollment in certain regions, he said.

“I’m really pleased with the way things are going here,” Carter said. Last year 90 kids participated in 4-H activities, and enrollment fees were paid by a concerned citizen, he said.

The public hearing for fairgrounds fee sched-

ule amendments was well attended. The Columbia County Friends of the Fairgrounds had asked the BOCC to take another look at the 2018 Equine Rental Fee Schedule. The BOCC adopted the following changes to the fee schedule:

The monthly stall rental for both the white and red barns, including tack stalls, with no arena use, is \$70. The stall fee per night is \$10. The damage deposit per stall is \$70. The stall and arena late payment fee is \$15.

The commissioners agreed to lower the monthly fee for the Arenas, which includes indoor, outdoor and track use, from \$60 to \$50, for non-exclusive use.

The non-exclusive use fee per day per person is \$12. The exclusive per-hour fee for indoor or outdoor, is \$10. The outdoor arena exclusive for the day and indoor arena exclusive for the day are both set at \$125.

“We will have security and cameras at the fairgrounds so we can really track who is coming and going,” said Commissioner Norm Passmore. “This keeps everybody honest. Our goal is to reduce costs, keep track of everyone down there, and keep track of the numbers, to show the public and go after grants.”

Passmore said the commissioners will revisit the fee schedule at the end of the year and make revisions as necessary.

At the end of that discussion, Facilities Manager Dave Finney passed out volunteer applications to the people on the Friends of the Fairgrounds committee.

The BOCC was also visited by Kathy Covey from the Blue Mountain Action Council, Elizabeth Garrett for the Coordinated Homeless Grant, and Ted Koehler, Housing Services Director in Walla Walla.

The commissioners decided to commit \$40,000 to the minor repair program to address home repairs for

qualifying low-income homeowners in the county in 2018.

In 2017 the BOCC committed \$20,000 to the Minor Home Repair Program, and Koehler said those funds helped two homeowners in Dayton with repairs to roofs, porches and for updating electrical and heating.

Funding is through revolving loans, and when there is a change in use of the homes, the money that was invested is returned to the program to help other homeowners, said Koehler.

“It’s a good idea to keep people in their own homes,” said Commissioner Mike Talbott.

Koehler said four to five additional homeowners can be helped in 2018.

County Public Health Administrator Martha Lanman said she is working on a grant through Puget Sound Energy for funding to replace pads and batteries for automated external defibrillators (AEDs) located in the schools, the hospital, the Sheriff’s Department and at the Last Resort.

Lanman also said that three-and-a-half years of attending regional Accountable Communities of Health meetings are about to pay off. She is beginning to prioritize Columbia County’s four ACH projects, along with others, and submit them for approval. Funding will begin in August. Some of the projects can be implemented in the county in the near future, she said.

Lanman said Leslie Sweetwater is working on a plan to place fruit at the high school sometime after the April spring break. A study ranked 10th graders in Washington lowest for getting enough fruit in their diets, she said.

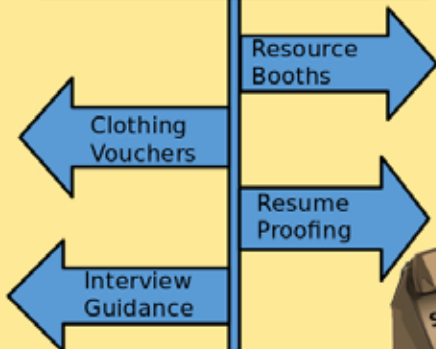

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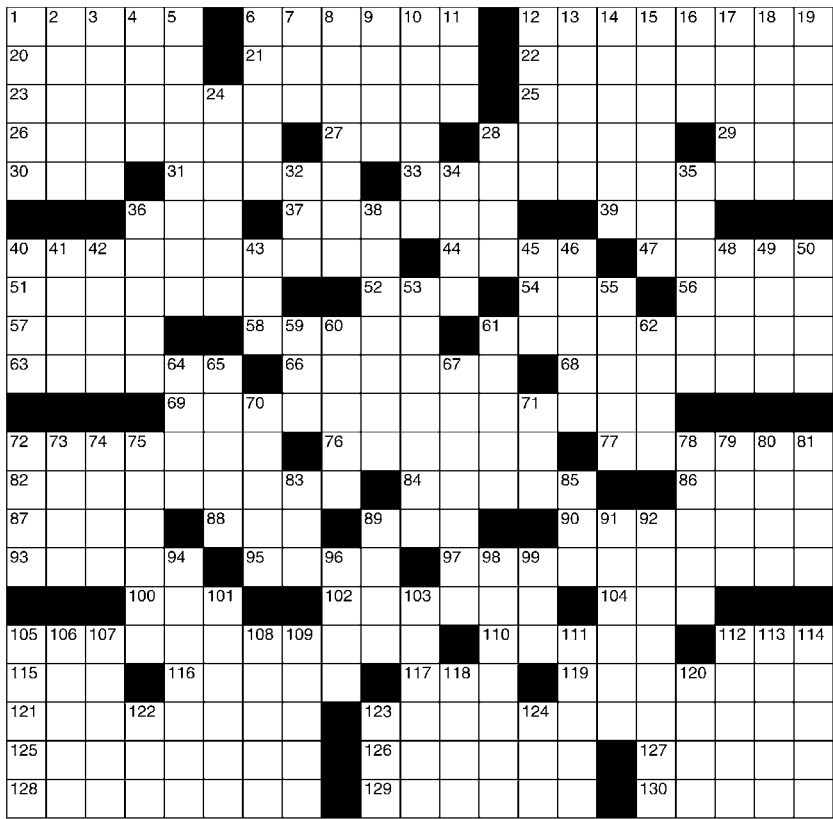

Broccoli Salad with Raisins, Bacon & Onions

We all need our vegetables. I love vegetable salads at potlucks, but I confess to rarely making them at home, probably because it would take forever to finish it. So most of my vegetables are eaten cooked or raw and plain.

I make this salad a lot for potlucks. Most times I have very little left. It is a great combination of sweet and salty. For those who don't eat bacon, I don't believe it compromises the flavor.

I had to do a search for this recipe as I'll be darned if I can find mine. My recipe drawer is much like my recipe box—what got used last in on top. I went to the bottom and still couldn't find it.



INGREDIENTS:

- 5 to 6 cups fresh broccoli florets
- ½ cup raisins (or cranraisins)
- ½ cup sunflower seeds
- ½ cup cooked crumbled bacon
- ¼ cup red onion chopped
- 1 cup frozen peas

DRESSING:

- 1 cup mayonnaise
- ½ cup sugar
- 2 TBSP vinegar

In a large bowl, combine all ingredients, in a separate bowl, mix the dressing well, and mix with the salad

My notes: The vinegar in the dressing will make it thin so I turn it over several times, especially before serving. This way all the broccoli gets covered. I use a little extra broccoli mostly because I don't like a lot of dressing. One recipe suggested low fat mayonnaise and less sugar, another suggested other kinds of nuts. I personally like the sunflower seeds. Another recipe suggested grated carrots and celery. I don't often stray away from the original! Enjoy!
